This fall, The Help Group's STEM³ Academy, the only K-12 school in the nation to provide STEM curriculum to students with social and learning differences, opened its third campus in Irvine; it's first school in Orange County.

Under the umbrella of The Help Group – the largest, most innovative nonprofit of its kind serving children and young adults with special needs -STEM³ Academy is able to provide students with high-functioning autism spectrum disorder, ADHD, and other social and learning differences the opportunity to maximize their potential.

Many students with social and learning differences have a passion for STEM fields and thrive while engaged in project-based learning. STEM³ Academy customizes its approach and curriculum to each student's individual strengths and needs. It offers robust science, technology, engineering and mathematics courses, as well as opportunities for students to fully explore the humanities. The hub of our school is a state of the art innovation lab and maker space where students are involved in diverse pursuits such as robotics, electronics, film, audio mixing, and 3D modeling and printing using a variety of high-tech equipment.

With a growing need for qualified STEM talent in Southern California and across the nation, STEM³ Academy prepares students for meaningful careers in a variety of fields, such as engineering, cyber-security, biomedical, coding, game development, accounting, web design, IT and the humanities. The school leverages partnerships and mentor programs with leading businesses to offer students real-world interaction and a first-hand knowledge of potential career paths.

According to Dr. Susan Berman, COO of The Help Group, "With a growing number of LGBTQ+ young people, including those with special needs who are seeking a safe place to connect with peers and explore their emerging identity, it was clear that there was a pressing community need for a program such as this. Believing that strengths in differences make the world a better place, and believing that all LGBTQ+ individuals should have access to a full complement of services, Kaleidoscope was born."

Kaleidoscope will offer the following: social events, social clubs, and a dropin center providing safe spaces for all; individual, group, and family support; vocational assessment and training; job opportunities at The Help Group's newest social enterprise – Silverlining – a resale store and café; sensitivity training to increase awareness and acceptance, and resources and referrals to meet differing needs.

According to Bryan Scheihing, LMFT and Director of Kaleidoscope, "It's important to recognize that LGBTQ+ youth are facing unique challenges. Those challenges are more complex when combined with social and learning differences – "a double rainbow." Understanding and accepting that each child, teen and young adult has a unique story is critical in providing more specialized support for this population."




Mercedes and Kerry, two parents featured in the video, spoke about how much The Help Group has meant to their children and families.



The Help Group is proud to announce that Emily Werman, a Help Group graduate and an accomplished tennis player who returned to our campus to teach, is the recipient of the ACEing Autism national essay contest. Emily, who helps to lead the ACEing Autism school tennis program here at The Help Group, will be flown to New York as a recipient of the prize. While there, she will be a guest at the U.S. Open, and attend several events, and a conference related to ACEing Autism where she will be able to promote the importance of the program to the autism community. She will also have the honor of helping run the ACEing Autism Clinic at Flushing Meadows where the U.S Open is held.

"I decided to enter into this essay competition because I have found this program so rewarding," says Emily. "I wanted to express how ACEing Autism has impacted my life and the lives of so many other children and families. Having been selected as the winner of this essay is a dream come true."

ACEing Autism is a non-profit organization, and its mission is to connect children with autism and their families through a unique tennis program. ACEing Autism promotes lifelong skills for young people with autism, such as physical fitness, social interaction, communication, and teamwork building.

"Coaching through the ACEing Autism program at The Help Group offered me a great opportunity to connect my love for tennis to working with kids on the spectrum. Moreover, I'm able to convey an important message: progress not perfection. I always remind students that we all make mistakes and that's okay. The important thing is to never give up and keep trying. There is always room to grow and improve, and getting better takes practice, just like anything else. These are the critical life lessons that were imparted to me at The Help Group as a young person," remarked Emily. Emily attended The Help Group from 7th to 12th grade, and even began coaching tennis to afterschool groups through ACEing Autism while she was a student. She later went on to attend Cal Lutheran University, and play tennis at the collegiate level while pursuing her bachelor's degree in Disabilities Studies.

"Emily is simply an outstanding teacher and tennis coach here at The Help Group. She's truly an accomplished individual and we are so moved by her excellent, award-winning essay. The Help Group is honored to have helped Emily achieve her lifelong goals," said Dr. Susan Berman, COO at The Help Group.

The Help Group hosted its 9th Annual Special Needs Resource Fair on Sunday, April 7th at the Autism Center in Sherman Oaks. The free event, which attracts more than 600 people each year, is an opportunity for parents and professionals to connect with the resources available for the special needs community, including children with autism spectrum disorder, learning disabilities, ADHD, developmental delays, and emotional challenges.

A diverse mix of exhibitors provided information and answered questions about services for

children, young people, and adults, as well as their families. There were representatives from support groups, medical and therapeutic services, educational supports, financial and estate planning, advocacy services, respite services, recreational and camping programs, vocational and residential programs, and more.

The event featured opportunities for children and families to interact with therapy dogs from the Alliance of Therapy Dogs; visit with animals from Special Spirit, Inc. Therapeutic Riding Center; and play with friends on the Hasbro playground. Food and snacks were available for guests.

The Help Group's Kids Like Me program – featured at the event – offers summer, winter and spring camps at The Help Group's Sherman Oaks and Culver City locations. Camp programs are developed by a multidisciplinary team to address unique strengths and abilities, foster social skills, and cultivate friendships. They are led by highly trained therapists and counselors, and campers are assessed and matched with the right program to ensure the best possible camp experience for everyone.

THE HELP GROUP'S 2019 ADVANCE LA CONFERENCE ------SHOWCASES PROMINENT EXPERTS AND CUTTING-EDGE RESEARCH



The Help Group's 2019 Advance LA Conference, Square Peg - Round Holes: Dare to be Different, took place on Friday, May 10 at the American Jewish University and featured 20 internationally prominent experts whose research and practice support young adults with autism, learning differences and ADHD. This year's conference theme focused on neurodiversity, Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT), LGBTQ+ research and support, social skills, career paths, executive functioning, and more. More than 300 parents, educators, clinicians, researchers, graduate, and undergraduate students were in attendance.


Our Keynote Speaker, Steve Silberman discussed the growing movement to frame autism and other conditions, such as dyslexia and ADHD, as natural human variations that deserve support and accommodations, rather than disorders that need to be eradicated from the human genome. Silberman advocates that neurological differences are authentic forms of human diversity, that all human lives have value, and that atypical forms of brain wiring can also convey unusual skills and aptitudes. He argues that society should help individuals make the most of their native strengths and special interests, rather than focusing on trying to correct their deficits or normalize their behavior.

In addition to Steve Silberman, other featured sessions and speakers included a popular DBT track by Sasha Ginsburg-Gutstein, LCSW and Erin Lotz, LCSW, Luncheon Speaker Rabbi Sherre Hirsch, and our afternoon keynotes Dr. Anthony Rostain and Dr. B. Janet Hibbs who showed fascinating video footage from a young adult's perspective on transitioning into college and adulthood. There was also a highly attended session by two young adults discussing their unique friendship and advice on how to form lasting connections.

On April 3rd, The Help Group once again hosted a Music for Autism concert on the Sherman Oaks campus. Music Director and pianist Ryan Cantwell joined The Help Group stage for the fourth time, and brought a few of the multi-talented cast members of *Charlie and The Chocolate Factory* – currently enjoying a terrific run at The Pantages Theater – along with additional seasoned performers.

For this special assembly, students from Bridgeport, Sunrise and Village Glen schools filled the Autism Center with excitement as they awaited the concert's start. Dr. Barbara Firestone, Help Group President and CEO, kicked off the hour with a few remarks and introductions of performers.

Sabrina Harper, a Broadway singer who has performed with Music for Autism before, gave a warm welcome to all the students. The cast then opened the show with "Pure Imagination" – a memorable classic from Charlie and The Chocolate Factory.

The rest of the concert included Disney songs like "Part Of Your World" from *The Little Mermaid*; "Let It Go" from *Frozen*; "Practically Perfect" from *Mary Poppins* and "Hakuna Matata" from *The Lion King*.

In a touching and uplifting moment, Collin Jeffrey, who plays Charlie in the show, sang "A Million Dreams" from The Greatest Showman. He was joined on stage by members of The Help Group Children's Choir who had recently performed the powerful song at this year's Teddy Bear Ball.

"It's so fulfilling for us to share our voice with the children, to see the happiness on their faces, and listen to them sing right along with us. What a beautiful way for them to express themselves. To bring the arts and music to the students of The Help Group today was really special," said Sabrina.

One of the performers, Brynn Williams, remarked, "I have three brothers and two are on the autism spectrum. It was so wonderful to be able to be here, and sing and share music with the students the way I do with my brothers back home."

The concert ended on a high note – with Ryan Cantwell teaching the students a lesson in conducting and percussion. Everyone in the audience joined in during this interactive portion of the show.

"How special that Ryan and such a talented group of performers could join us as we recognize National Autism Awareness Month. The opportunity for our students to dance and sing along with them was truly a gift," said Dr. Firestone.

SPECIALIZED DAY SCHOOLS

Our Newest School... Located in Valley Glen, Culver City and now in Irvine, **STEM³ Academy** provides an innovative rigorous K-12 curriculum for students with social and learning differences, including autism, who have a passion for STEM fields and may benefit from experiential learning approaches.*

*With a 98% college acceptance rate...*Summit View School is a collegepreparatory program for students with learning differences who possess average to above-average intellectual capabilities.*

Village Glen School is a college preparatory program that serves students K-12 with high-functioning autism and challenges in the areas of socialization, language development and peer relations. The Pace Program offers honors and AP classes for gifted students. The Beacon Program provides additional positive behavior support for students with behavioral challenges.*

Young Learners uses an evidence-based and interdisciplinary approach to intensive early intervention for pre-school age to kindergarten with autism spectrum disorder.

Bridgeport School provides basic skills education, community based instruction and vocational training, for students ages 5 to 22 with mild to moderate cognitive delays and challenges with social communication and/ or language development.

Bridgeport Vocational Education Center is for young adults with autism spectrum disorder and other developmental differences, ages 18 to 22, providing vocational skills training, including supported job placements.

Sunrise School is a functional life skills program serving students ages 5 to 22 with moderate to severe cognitive delays associated with autism spectrum disorder and other developmental disabilities.

The Help Group's Westview School of Arts and Technology provides a nurturing therapeutic learning environment dedicated to supporting students with social and emotional challenges and helps them to achieve academic and personal success.*

The Help Group's North Hills Prep offers a college preparatory curriculum while supporting students with social emotional challenges.*

THE HELP GROUP'S LEARNING CENTER

The Help Group Learning Center is a K-12 program which provides a tailored educational curriculum for families who have opted to homeschool their children. The Learning Center provides a rigorous curriculum in the core academic subjects, as well as opportunities for accelerated learning. Social Emotional learning is embedded in the curriculum.

MENTAL HEALTH & CLINICAL PROGRAMS

These programs provide a continuum of comprehensive outpatient services for children and families, including assessment; individual, family and group therapy; case management; psychiatric services; parenting groups; in-home counseling; school-based mental health counseling; neuropsychological testing; **REACH** - after-school day rehabilitation; **Stepping Stones** - an intensive day treatment for children ages 3 to 5 and therapeutic behavioral services. **Full Service Partnership** is a community-based program that provides intensive services to both children struggling with mental health issues and their families.


